- Qualitative Adjectives describe the qualities of a person or thing - whether they are large or small, happy or sad, etc.
- Quantitative Adjectives describe the exact or approximate amount of a noun. Example - all, no, few, little.
- Demonstrative Adjectives answer the question "which?". They point out the Nouns that precede them. Example - This, that, these, those, etc.
- Interrogative Adjectives are used with Nouns to ask questions. Example - which, what, whose, etc.
- Possessive Adjectives show possession or belonging. Example - my, your, our, etc.
